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One of the major events of the Soroptimist year has gone. The Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) has finished and while we may not have made progress in some desired areas that thin line which marks progress has been held and at least there were Agreed Conclusions unlike some years.

As a virtual CSW, it was unusual and it offered opportunities for up to 25,000 registrants to have an opportunity to watch discussions live on UN TV, attend side events sponsored by different nations and have a choice of over 700 events into which to choose to Zoom it was over-whelming in some ways and the time difference in our countries did make it difficult for those who work. For those of us who pursue extensive unpaid work it was still exhausting and I know that after several days of extremely early starts my ageing body refused to continue. It recalled when CSW was actual and you could focus more easily as your usual life was thousands of kilometres away and you could sleep more regularly.

Nevertheless it was its usual eye-opening self where attendees saw many cultures, heard differing views of issues and recognised the passion and commitment of many women through-out the world who fought, often at personal risk, to make a difference for women and children in their community and beyond. All this made the importance of advocacy far more real.

Advocacy Work

Advocating on behalf of women is a core Soroptimist function, and this month the programme team is pleased to once again be able to report on Soroptimist Advocacy work.

Is your club looking for some Advocacy ideas?

Showcasing a number of clubs who have undertaken a variety of Advocacy activities including:

1. **SI Port Pirie** - contacted 4 Ministers of Parliament who are members of the Food Forum of Australia and New Zealand, encouraging them to endorse an evidence-based warning on foetal alcohol syndrome on alcohol containers.
2. **Jobseeker:**
 - a. **SI Torrens** - Raise the Rate: COVID 19 saw a temporary increase in a JobSeeker payment which improved the lives of women and children. There was concern that when this was stopped that the original payment would tip recipients back into poverty.
 - b. **SI Southern Districts Adelaide Inc** - Advocacy to Federal Government to maintain extra COVID-19 jobseeker entitlements: Letters sent by club members to Federal Members of Parliament to address concerns about future proposals to scrap the current amount in Jobseeker entitlements and return to the original Pre Covid 19 Newstart payments. Members sent 15 letters and one phone call was made to the local Federal Member's Office.
3. **SI Adelaide** - Wicked Campers is a business which hires out campervans across Australia. These vans are covered with disrespectful language directed towards women and girls. Some jurisdictions have taken action on banning Wicked Campers in their state, but South Australia has not yet done this.
4. **SI Southern Districts Adelaide** - Advocacy to continue the Federal Government focus on the issue of Aboriginal deaths in custody: Members signed a petition circulated by SI Beenleigh to refocus the attention of the Federal Government on the issue of Aboriginal deaths in custody. This petition asked that these matters be returned to the current agenda as a key issue at the next meeting of the National Cabinet in the light of circumstances in the USA and the black lives matter movement.
5. **SI Southern Districts Adelaide** - Advocacy to remove the presumption of equal shared parental responsibility (ESPR) from the Family Law Act: Letters sent to the

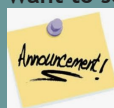
Prime Minister, the Australian Attorney General and the Minister for Women, asked for the removal of presumption of Equal Shared Parental Responsibility from the Family Law Act. Several high-level reports have recommended that presumption be replaced and not linked to equal time. This was being inappropriately applied in cases involving family violence putting children at risk of further abuse. Members also signed a petition prepared by the Women's Legal Services Australia.

Using a generic username and password, to log on, will enable you to search and see what other clubs, zones or regions are doing. You can download these. - View and Download individual reports
- Search across Reports submitted to the database from the Reports Table

The Best Practice Awards are presented by our Federation to acknowledge outstanding projects by member clubs. Our next acknowledgement is during the Interim Board Meeting in May this year. Awards are given in each of the Goal 2 Objectives i.e. Education, Elimination of Violence, Economic Empowerment, Food Security, Healthcare, Environment and Conflict Resolution.

Eligible projects are those implemented and completed during 2020. All projects must have been approved and published on the report database. The ID number required can be found on the report, either on the database or on the summary returned to the club. Any project which won at the last round of awards at the conference of Clubs in 2020 is not eligible this time.

The Programme of Service team reserves the right to not give an award in any category if the project is not considered to be of sufficiently high standard even if it is the only nomination in a category.

Programme of Service Meeting at the IBM

Others are able to attend as silent observers who will not have the option to speak. Any club can ask a question but it must be raised by the appropriate person who is a member of the extended programme of Service. A form to register as a silent observer will be sent to all clubs shortly.

Which Sustainable Development Goal?



The SDGs are extremely wide ranging and at times you may find it difficult to decide which SDG or target best defines your project. Take Education for example, your best fit for what you have done may not be a target in SDG 4. It may belong in another SDG target.

The Programme of Service team has produced several documents to assist you with this. The latest document titled 'Which SDG?' It explores targets for 8 particular areas in which projects are held. They are Education, Elimination of violence, Economic empowerment, Food security, Healthcare, Environmental sustainability/water and sanitation, Conflict resolution/peace promotion and Disaster relief and mitigation.

Clubs need to be sure about the overall purpose of their project, advocacy or action when planning it. Some parts of a project may fit different SDGs but the overall goal determines this and it is under that SDG that you enter your report. Your target should be from this Goal. Around the Federation

International Womens Day was celebrated by many clubs throughout the federation we know this because many clubs have posts on Facebook showing some great events that have been arranged and attended. **Please don't forget to enter your activity in the Programme Database so the programme team can access information about your work.**

SI Randwick & Eastern Suburbs Inc joined in the 'Clean Up Australia Day' to clean up a local beach and surrounding parkland.

During the Covid-19 lockdown, being able to get outside and enjoy meeting with friends and family in these public areas has been very important.

The Club became involved in the 'Clean Up Australia Day' to remove as much plastic pollution as possible, preventing this from going into the ocean and affecting local wildlife. They found a lot of cigarette butts and a surprising amount of confetti. Given these areas are also maintained by the local council the group were doubly surprised to find so much litter.



SI Suva

Cub members used their deferred Saturday of Service to plant mangrove seedlings as part of the defence of their country's foreshore. Fiji is threatened by rising sea levels and mangroves are a vital part of the 300 plus islands' defences. This action brings the total of seedlings planted over 3 years to 23,000 of which 18,000 have been planted this year.

The club invited other citizens to join them in the activity which was widely promoted. Their commitment is to the environment and securing the future for the next generation. The photo shows the club President hard at work.

SI Murray Bridge, South Australia

The club had a novel approach to their International Womens day event. They decided on a film festival. Films by South Australian women which illustrated the Road to Equality for women and girls through Empowerment and Education were sourced. The topics covered were:

- Child and forced marriages
- Rights of older women
- Mental health in our communities
- Modern day slavery
- Migration and cultural awareness



This involved a laborious search through over 50 films, contact with the producers and adaptation to the technical requirements. This free film festival attracted 74 women ranging in age from 17 to late 70s. So involved were the women that many stayed afterwards to discuss these issues from their local community and talk about ways in which they might be able to help.
