The outbreak of COVID-19 has caused significant social, political and economic consequences worldwide. A health crisis, leaving no country behind with a greater challenge and impact on our lives.

DID YOU KNOW?



With World Environment Day in mind ...

1. Biodiversity involves 8 million plant and animal species, the ecosystems that house them, and the genetic diversity among them.
2. In the last 150 years, the live coral reef cover has been reduced by half.
3. Within the next 10 years, one out of every four known species may have been wiped off the planet.
4. It would take 1.6 Earths to meet the demands that humans make on nature each year.



Offset your Carbon Footprint

Offset your Carbon Footprint with native trees and shrubs which have a powerful role to play in the fight against climate change.

Did you know 62 trees will help to remove about 14 tonnes of carbon? National Carbon Calculator helps you work out how many native shrubs and trees you will need to plant to mitigate your carbon footprint from today as your trees or forest grows over time.

For example, of the number of native trees you would need to plant to mitigate your CO2 emissions from today over 50 years:

- A return flight from Auckland to Sydney = 4 native trees
- Household electricity use for 1 year (8,000 kWh) = 3 native trees
- Use of medium sized car, 10,000km = 9 native trees

The above total tree count CO2 calculation is derived from using the carbon calculator and is based off an assumption

that the tree count is made up of a range of between 5% tall tree species and 95% shrubs (smaller trees) through to 25% tall tree species and 75% shrubs (smaller trees) and is calculated over a 50-year timeframe – assuming the trees are planted and grow for all of that period.

SI Bangkok's planting initiative

In 2018, SI Bangkok launched its Climate Change Initiative to promote sustainable development, to decrease air pollution by planting trees in Thailand and to reduce the consumption of disposable plastic.

Their goal is to improve air quality and combat climate change in Thailand by planting 10,000 trees. At the heart of air pollution is the invisible air pollutant, PM 2.5. Planting trees improves air quality by cooling and removing pollutants from the surrounding area (i.e. within a 100 foot radius of each individual tree). Commonly known as the 'silent killer', smog kills 50,000 people in Thailand every year. SI Bangkok has for several years been involved in a tree planting exercise with a number of partners.

SI Bangkok organises and executes 'planting' days which aim to get local communities involved and thereby feel more responsible for protecting their environment. To date, over a thousand trees have been planted. An example of their actions was in May 2019 when Soroptimist members and tree planting enthusiasts waded through muddy water to plant 441 saplings in the mangroves in Samut Songkram province. Mangroves benefit forests and help to protect coastlines from storm

surges, filter out pollutants, and provide shelter to a wide array of diverse lifeforms. Mangroves also sequester massive amounts of carbon, which helps mitigate the impact and combat climate change. More information in our next eSPAN.

SI New Zealand North – 100 Trees to Celebrate 100 Years



SI New Zealand North region has set up an account with the Trees that Count organisation as part of its contribution to both the environment and SI 100 years celebration. Clubs in the region are supporting this initiative by purchasing trees to offset their carbon footprint. This is a great way to support the planting of

native trees.

Fiji

SI Ba, Fiji



The Federation project first Sanctuary: Shelter for Women was handed over in May 2020, the Covid lockdown in Lautoka slowed everything down and resulted in a delay in the handover of the building. SI Ba did not let this delay or deter them from undertaking hands-on activities to maintain the building, ensure it was clean inside and out, hanging curtains and preparing beds for their first visitors. Activities also included planting a

combination of ornamental plants around the building with some fruit bearing trees also planted on the grounds.

The club has been very busy this year after Tropical Cyclone Yasa. They donated 100 pillows to affected households in one area and followed this by the collection and distribution of household necessities in the Rakiraki area.

SI Petaling Jaya

SI Petaling Jaya was busy working with a partner to organise an online presentation of critical information about child sexual abuse and access to accurate and appropriate information about sexuality and safe puberty issues.

Five podcasts were created as well as 3 practical online sessions for 100 young participants.
